





SUMMARY

**Morgan County Commission
October 1, 2007 through September 30, 2008**

The Morgan County Commission (the "Commission") is a five-member body elected by the citizens of Morgan County. The members and administrative personnel in charge of governance of the Commission are listed on Exhibit 17. The Commission is the governmental agency that provides general administration, public safety, construction and maintenance of county roads and bridges, sanitation services, health and welfare services and educational services to the citizens of Morgan County.

This report presents the results of an audit the objectives of which were to determine whether the financial statements present fairly the financial position and results of financial operations and whether the Commission complied with applicable laws and regulations, including those applicable to its major federal financial assistance programs. The audit was conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States as well as the requirements of the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts under the authority of the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Section 41-5-14.

An unqualified opinion was issued on the financial statements, which means that the Commission's financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, its financial position and the results of its operations for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2008.

Tests performed during the audit did not disclose any significant instances of noncompliance with applicable state and local laws and regulations.

Independent Auditor's Report

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Morgan County Commission, as of and for the year ended September 30, 2008, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements of the Morgan County Commission as listed in the table of contents as Exhibits 1 through 11. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Morgan County Commission's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit.


We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinions.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Morgan County Commission, as of September 30, 2008, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows, where applicable, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated July 10, 2009 on our consideration of the Morgan County Commission's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

The accompanying Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) and the Schedules of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances – Budget and Actual and the Schedule of Funding Progress (Exhibits 12 through 15) are not required parts of the basic financial statements but are supplementary information required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Morgan County Commission's basic financial statements. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (Exhibit 16) as required by U. S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

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Management's Discussion and Analysis
(Required Supplementary Information)

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of Morgan County Commission's annual financial report presents our discussion and analysis of the Commission's financial performance during the fiscal year that ended on September 30, 2008. Please read it in conjunction with the Commission's financial statements, which follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS


- The Commission's total net assets decreased by \$1,878,800 over the course of the year's operations. Net assets of our business-type activities increased by \$18,000 (or approximately 1%), while the net assets of our governmental activities decreased by \$1,896,800 (or 4.57%)
- In the County's governmental activities, expenses increased by \$5,217,900 or approximately 16.70%, while revenues increased by \$438,900 (or approximately 1.29%).
- In the County's business-type activities, operating expenses increased by 4.26%, while operating revenues increased by approximately 11.40%
- The General Fund used \$390,000 in prior year reserves to finance current year programs. The Gasoline Tax Fund reserve decreased by \$555,300. The Public Buildings, Roads, and Bridges Fund reserve amount decreased by \$88,100.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This annual report consists of three parts--*management's discussion and analysis* (this section), the *basic financial statements*, and *required supplementary information*. The basic financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the Commission.

- The first two statements are *government-wide financial statements* that provide both *long-term* and *short-term* information about the Commission's *overall* financial status.
- The remaining statements are *fund financial statements* that focus on *individual parts* of the Commission government, reporting the Commission's operations in *more detail* than the government-wide statements.
 - --The *governmental funds* statements tell how *general government* services like public safety were financed in the *short-term* as well as what remains for future spending.
- *Proprietary fund* statements offer *short-* and *long-term* financial information about the activities the government operates *like businesses*, such as the environmental services.
 - *Fiduciary fund* statements provide information about financial relationships - like the District Attorney and Worthless Check Funds - in which the Commission acts solely as a *trustee or agent* for the benefit of others, to whom the resources in question belong.

The financial statements also include *notes* that explain some of the information in the financial statements and provide more detailed data. The statements are followed by a section of *required supplementary information* that further explains and supports the information in the financial statements. Figure A-1 shows how the required parts of this annual report are arranged and relate to one another.

Figure A-2 summarizes the major features of the Commission's financial statements, including the portion of the County government they cover and the types of information they contain. The remainder of this overview section of management's discussion and analysis explains the structure and contents of each of the statements.

Government-wide Statements

The government-wide statements report information about the Commission as a whole using accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. The statement of net assets includes *all* of the government’s assets and liabilities. All of the current year’s revenues and expenses are accounted for in the statement of activities regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The two government-wide statements report the Commission's *net assets* and how they have changed. Net assets - the difference between the Commission's assets and liabilities - is one way to measure the Commission's financial health, or *position*.

- Over time, increases or decreases in the Commission's net assets are an indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating, respectively.
- To assess the overall health of the Commission you need to consider additional nonfinancial factors such as changes in the Commission's property tax base and the condition of the county's roads.

The government-wide financial statements of the Commission are divided into two categories:

- *Governmental activities* - Most of the Commission's basic services are included here, such as public safety, highways and roads, and general administration. Property taxes and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.
- *Business-type activities* - The Commission charges fees to customers to help it cover the cost of certain services it provides. The Commission's environmental services are included here.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the Commission's most significant funds - not the Commission as a whole. Funds are accounting devices that the Commission uses to keep track of specific sources of funding and spending for particular purposes.

- Some funds are required by State law and by bond covenants.
- The County Commission establishes other funds to control and manage money for particular purposes or to show that it is properly using certain taxes and grants.

The Morgan County Commission has three kinds of funds:

- *Governmental Funds* - Most of the Commission's basic financial services are included in governmental funds, which focus on (1) how *cash and other financial assets* that can readily be converted to cash flow in and out and (2) the balances left at year-end that are available for spending. Consequently, the governmental funds statements provide a detailed *short-term* view that helps you determine whether there are more or fewer financial resources that can be spent in near future to finance the Commission's programs. Because this information does not encompass the additional long-term focus of the government-wide statements, we provide additional information at the bottom of the governmental funds statement, or on the subsequent page, that explains the relationship (or differences) between them.
- *Proprietary funds* - Services for which the Commission charges customers a fee are generally reported in proprietary funds. Proprietary funds, like the government-wide statements, provide both long- and short-term financial information.
 - In fact, the Commission's *enterprise fund* (one type of proprietary fund) is the same as its business-type activities, but provides more detail and additional information, such as cash flows.

- *Fiduciary funds* - The Commission is responsible for other assets that—because of a trust arrangement - can be used only for the trust beneficiaries. The Commission is responsible for ensuring that the assets reported in these funds are used for their intended purposes. All the Commission’s fiduciary activities are reported in a separate statement of fiduciary net assets and a statement of changes in fiduciary net assets. We exclude these activities from the Commission’s government-wide financial statements because the Commission cannot use these assets to finance its operations.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE COUNTY AS A WHOLE

Net Assets. The Commission’s combined net assets decreased between fiscal years 2007 and 2008 by approximately \$1.84 to \$41.58 million. Net assets for business-type activities increased 1% to \$2.00 million while net assets for governmental activities decreased by 4.49% to \$39.58 million.

Changes in net assets. The Commission’s total revenues were approximately \$36.85 million. (See Table A-2). Approximately 45% of the Commission’s revenue comes from property taxes, and 47 cents of every dollar raised comes from some type of tax. Another 26 cents comes from fees charged for services, and the majority of the remainder is state and federal aid.

The total cost of all programs and services was approximately \$38.73 million. The Commission’s expenses cover a range of services with approximately 60% related to general government and public safety.

Revenues for Fiscal Year 2007-2008



Expenditures for Fiscal Year 2007-2008



Governmental Activities

The decrease in net assets includes a \$1 million dollar appropriation to Calhoun Community College for a robotic center. It also includes a decrease of approximately \$319,000 in interest revenue and an increase in fuel expenses of approximately \$161,000.

Table A-3 presents the cost of each of the Commission's five largest programs – general government, public safety, highways and roads, welfare, and culture and recreation – as well as each programs *net cost* (total cost less fees generated by the activities and intergovernmental aid). The net cost shows the financial burden that was placed on the Commission's taxpayers by each of these functions.

- The cost of all governmental activities this year was \$36.46 million, including depreciation expenses of \$2.61 million. The total cost increased from the prior year by \$5.22 million. This increase is mainly due to increases in payroll and benefits costs, increases in fuel costs, and a one-time appropriation to Calhoun Community College for a robotics program. The Commission was able to give employees a 5% cost of living raise for the fiscal year 2007-2008.
- The net cost to taxpayers for these activities was \$21.36 million. Some of the costs were paid by:
 - Those who directly benefited from the programs (\$7.17 million), or
 - Other governments and organizations that subsidized certain programs with grants and contributions (\$7.93 million)

- The Commission paid for the \$21.36 million “public benefit” portion with prior year reserves, property taxes, and with other revenues such as sales taxes, and investment earnings.

Business-Type Activities

Revenues of the Commission’s business-type activities increased from the prior year by approximately \$230,000 while expenses increased by approximately \$92,600. The increase in revenue is due to a rate increase of \$1.00 for garbage collection beginning in August 2007.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE COMMISSION’S FUNDS

As the Commission completed the year, its governmental funds reported a *combined* fund balance of \$16.82 million representing a decrease from the prior year’s combined fund balance of \$18.00 million.

Major Funds Budgetary Highlights

Over the course of the year, the County Commission revised the County budget several times. These budget amendments fall into categories:

- Amendments and supplemental appropriations approved shortly after the beginning of the year to reflect the actual beginning account balances (correcting the estimated amounts in the original budget).
- Changes made to account for the various grants which were awarded during the year.
- Increases in appropriations to prevent budget overruns.

With these adjustments, actual expenditures of the major funds were approximately \$990,000 less than budgeted expenditures and actual revenues were approximately \$202,000 more than anticipated revenues.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At the end of 2008, the Commission had invested \$50.09 million in a broad range of capital assets for its governmental activities. (See Table A-4). This amount represents a net decrease (including additions and deductions) of .57 million or approximately 1.13% over last year.

The Commission began several capital projects during fiscal year 2008. These projects include a new environmental building and a new animal control building. These projects should be completed by September 30, 2009. The total estimated amount for both buildings is 2.2 million. More detailed information about the Commission's capital assets is presented in Note 5 to the financial statements.

Long-term Debt

At year-end, the Commission had \$25.90 million in bonds outstanding - a decrease of \$.12 million over last year - as shown in Table A-5. More detailed information about the Commission's long-term liabilities is presented in Note 12 to the financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended September 30, 2008

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of the Morgan County Commission (the “Commission”) have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government’s accounting policies are described below.

A. Reporting Entity

The Morgan County Commission is a general purpose local government governed by separately elected commissioners. The accompanying financial statements present the activities of the Morgan County Commission, (the primary government). Generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) require that the financial reporting entity consist of the primary government and its component units. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements present the Commission (a primary government).

Component units are legally separate organizations for which the elected officials of the primary government are financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity’s financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. Based on the application of these criteria, there are no component units which should be included as part of the financial reporting entity of the Commission.

B. Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The statement of net assets and the statement of activities display information about the Commission. These statements include the financial activities of the primary government, except for fiduciary activities. Eliminations have been made to minimize the double counting of internal activities. These statements distinguish between the governmental and business-type activities of the Commission. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other nonexchange transactions. Business-type activities are financed in whole or in part by fees charged to external parties.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended September 30, 2008

The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each segment of the business-type activities of the Commission and for each function of the Commission's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a program or function and, therefore, are clearly identifiable to a particular function. The Commission does not allocate indirect expenses to the various functions. Program revenues include (a) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or program and (b) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues, including all taxes, are presented as general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements

The fund financial statements provide information about the Commission's funds, including fiduciary funds. Separate statements for each fund category - governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary - are presented. The emphasis of fund financial statements is on major governmental and enterprise funds, each displayed in a separate column. All remaining governmental funds are aggregated and reported as nonmajor funds in the Other Governmental Funds' column.

The Commission reports the following major governmental funds:

- ◆ **General Fund** – The general fund is the primary operating fund of the Commission. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The Commission primarily received revenues from collections of property taxes and revenues collected by the State of Alabama and shared with the Commission. Also, accounted for in the general fund is employee health insurance to self-insure the Commission against liability claims.
- ◆ **Gasoline Tax Fund** – This fund is used to account for the expenditure of the County's share of the state-wide 7-cent gasoline tax. Revenues are earmarked for building and maintaining county roads.
- ◆ **Public Buildings, Roads and Bridges Fund** – This fund is used to account for the expenditures of special county property taxes for building and maintaining public buildings, roads and bridges.

The Commission reports the following major enterprise fund:

- ◆ **Environmental Services Fund** – This fund is used to account for the cost of providing solid waste service to county residents.

The Commission reports the following governmental fund types in the Other Governmental Funds' column:

Governmental Fund Types

- ◆ **Special Revenue Funds** – These funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than those derived from special assessments or dedicated for major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.
- ◆ **Debt Service Funds** – These funds are used to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, the Commission's principal and interest on governmental bonds.
- ◆ **Capital Projects Funds** – These funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities (other than those financed by proprietary funds).

The Commission reports the following fiduciary fund types:

Fiduciary Fund Types

- ◆ **Private-Purpose Trust Funds** – These funds are used to report all trust agreements under which principal and income benefit individuals, private organizations, or other governments.
- ◆ **Agency Funds** – These funds are used to report assets held by the Commission in a purely custodial capacity. The Commission collects these assets and transfers them to the proper individual, private organizations, or other government.

C. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the proprietary fund and fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time liabilities are incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Nonexchange transactions, in which the Commission gives (or receives) value without directly receiving (or giving) equal value in exchange, include property taxes, grants, entitlements, and donations.

On an accrual basis, revenue from grants, entitlements, and donations is recognized in the fiscal year in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Revenue from property taxes is recognized in the fiscal year for which the taxes are levied.

As a general rule the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the Commission considers revenues to be available if they are collected within sixty (60) days of the end of the current fiscal year. Expenditures are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on general long-term debt, claims and judgments, and compensated absences, which are recognized as expenditures to the extent they have matured. General capital asset acquisitions are reported as expenditures in governmental funds. General long-term debt issued and acquisitions under capital leases are reported as other financing sources.

Proprietary funds distinguish operating revenues and expenses from nonoperating items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the Commission's enterprise funds are charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for enterprise funds include the cost of sales and services, administrative expenses, and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

Under the terms of grant agreements, the Commission funds certain programs by a combination of specific cost-reimbursement grants, categorical block grants, and general revenues. Thus, when program expenses are incurred, there are both restricted and unrestricted net assets available to finance the program. It is the Commission's policy to first apply cost-reimbursement grant resources to such programs, followed by general revenues.

Private-sector standards of accounting and financial reporting issued prior to December 1, 1989, generally are followed in both the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements to the extent that those standards do not conflict with or contradict guidance of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. Governments also have the option of following subsequent private-sector guidance for their business-type activities and enterprise funds, subject to this same limitation. The Commission has not elected to follow subsequent private-sector guidance.

D. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Assets/Fund Balances

1. Deposits

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and demand deposits. For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the proprietary fund type considers all highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents.

2. Receivables

All ad valorem tax receivables are shown net of an allowance for uncollectibles. The allowance for uncollectibles for ad valorem tax is based on past collection experience.

Millage rates for property taxes are levied at the first regular meeting of the Commission in February of each year. Property taxes are assessed for property as of October 1 of the preceding year based on the millage rates established by the County Commission. Property taxes are due and payable the following October 1 and are delinquent after December 31. Amounts receivable, net of estimated refunds and estimated uncollectible amounts, are recorded for the property taxes levied in the current year. However, since the amounts are not available to fund current year operations, the revenue is deferred and recognized in the subsequent fiscal year when the taxes are both due and collectible and available to fund operations.

Receivables due from other governments include amounts due from grantors for grants issued for specific programs and capital projects.

Receivables from external parties are amounts that are being held in a trustee or agency capacity by the fiduciary funds.

3. Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items in both government-wide and fund financial statements.

4. Restricted Assets

Certain general obligation bonds, as well as certain resources set aside for their repayment, are classified as restricted assets on the balance sheet because they are maintained in separate bank accounts and their use is limited by applicable bond covenants. The debt service funds are used to segregate resources accumulated for debt service payments.

5. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, equipment, and infrastructure assets (e.g., roads, bridges, water and sewer systems, and similar items), are reported in the applicable governmental and business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. Such assets are valued at cost where historical records are available and at an estimated historical cost where no historical records exist. Donated fixed assets are valued at their estimated fair market value on the date received. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Major outlays of capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Interest incurred during the construction phase of capital assets of business-type activities is included as part of the capitalized value of the assets constructed.

Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the assets estimated useful life. Capitalization thresholds (the dollar values above which asset acquisitions are added to the capital asset accounts) and estimated useful lives of capital assets reported in the government-wide statements and proprietary funds are as follows:

The Commission began retroactively reporting its major general infrastructure assets (assets that were acquired between October 1, 1980 to September 30, 2002, or that received major renovations, restorations or improvements during that period) as of the fiscal year ending September 30, 2007.

The majority of governmental activities infrastructure assets are roads and bridges. The Association of County Engineers has determined that due to the climate and materials used in road construction, the base of the roads in the County will not deteriorate and therefore should not be depreciated. The remaining part of the roads, the surface, will deteriorate and will be depreciated. The entire costs of bridges in the County will be depreciated.

6. Long-Term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, and proprietary fund types in the fund financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities, business-type activities, or proprietary fund type statement of net assets. Warrant premiums, issuance costs and deferred loss on refunding are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds.

Warrants payable are reported gross of the applicable warrant premium and deferred loss on refunding. Warrant issuance costs are reported as deferred charges and amortized over the term of the related debt.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt issued is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses.

Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

Debt issuance cost for the Series 2003 Jail Construction Warrants in the amount of \$237,985.62 are being amortized over 20 years. At September 30, 2008, the amount due within the next year is \$11,752.38. Unamortized premiums in the amount of \$2,031.30 are also being amortized over 20 years. The amount to be amortized within the next year is \$100.31. There was also a deferred loss on this issue in the amount of \$36,166.63 that is being amortized over 8 years. Amounts to be amortized within the next year are \$4,988.50.

Debt issuance cost for the Series 2004 Jail Construction Warrants in the amount of \$270,270.34 are being amortized over 25 years. At September 30, 2008, the amount due within the next year was \$10,774.90. Unamortized premiums in the amount of \$44,823.25 are also being amortized over 25 years. Amounts to be amortized within the next year are \$1,786.97.

7. Compensated Absences

The Commission has a standard leave policy for its full-time employees as to sick and annual leave.

Annual Leave

For the first through the fourth year each employee is credited 13 days of annual leave, the fifth to ninth years earns an employee 16.25 days of annual leave per year. The tenth through fourteenth years an employee earns 19.50 days per year. The fifteenth through the nineteenth years earns an employee 22.75 days of annual leave per year. Upon completion of the nineteenth year, an employee is credited with 26 days per year and each year thereafter. Unused annual leave credits may be accumulated and carried over into successive calendar years up to a maximum aggregate of 240 hours. Upon separation or retirement, employees are paid for all accrued annual leave.

Sick Leave

Sick leave benefits with pay are provided for permanent full-time employees in the amount of 12 workdays per fiscal year. Sick leave benefits are accrued by all non-probationary permanent full-time employees at a rate of 1 workday per month of continuous employment and credited each month. Unused sick leave credits may be accumulated and carried over into successive fiscal years by employees. There is no limit on the number of hours an employee may accrue. All unused sick leave is forfeited upon separation and is not compensated to the employee.

Compensatory Leave

Compensatory leave is provided to permanent full-time employees in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act and is provided to permanent full-time employees to compensate for periods of work outside of normal working hours for which the employee has not received compensation. According to the Fair Labor Standards Act, employees should be paid for compensatory leave in excess of the maximum hours stipulated. Unused compensatory leave can be carried over 30 days, at the end of which, if not used is paid out at the overtime rate.

At September 30, 2008, no liability for unpaid sick leave is accrued in the financial statements since employees do not receive termination payments for sick leave balances.

As of September 30, 2008, the liability for accrued annual and compensatory leave due within one year is \$233,660.47 for the governmental activities and \$6,531.70 for the business-type activities. The long-term liability for accrued annual and compensatory leave is \$608,078.63 for the governmental activities and \$19,586.57 for the business-type activities.

8. Net Assets/Fund Equity

Net assets are reported on the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements and are required to be classified for accounting and reporting purposes into the following net asset categories:

- ◆ **Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt** – Capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and outstanding principal balances of debt attributable to the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets. Any significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end related to capital assets are not included in this calculation.
- ◆ **Restricted** – Constraints imposed on net assets by external creditors, grantors, contributors, laws or regulations of other governments, or law through constitutional provision or enabling legislation.
- ◆ **Unrestricted** – Net assets that are not subject to externally imposed stipulations. Unrestricted net assets may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Commission.

Fund equity is reported in the fund financial statements. Governmental funds report reservations of fund balance for amounts that are not available for appropriation or are legally restricted by outside parties for use for a specific purpose. Designations of fund balance represent tentative management plans that are subject to change.

Note 2 – Stewardship, Compliance, and Accountability

Budgets

Annual budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for all governmental funds except the capital projects funds, which adopt project-length budgets. All annual appropriations lapse at fiscal year-end.

The present statutory basis for county budgeting operations is the County Financial Control Act of 1935 as amended by Act Number 2007-488, Acts of Alabama. According to the terms of the law at some meeting in September of each year, but in any event not later than October 1, the Commission must estimate the anticipated revenues, estimated expenditures and appropriations for the respective amounts that are to be used for each such purpose. The appropriations must not exceed the total revenues available for appropriation. Expenditures may not legally exceed appropriations.

Budgets may be adjusted during the fiscal year when approved by the County Commission. Any changes must be within the revenues and reserves estimated to be available.

Note 3 – Deposits

Deposits

The custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of a bank failure, the Commission will not be able to cover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The Commission's deposits at year-end were entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by the Security for Alabama Funds Enhancement Program (SAFE Program). The SAFE Program was established by the Alabama Legislature and is governed by the provisions contained in the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Sections 41-14A-1 through 41-14A-14. Under the SAFE Program all public funds are protected through a collateral pool administered by the Alabama State Treasurer's Office. Under this program, financial institutions holding deposits of public funds must pledge securities as collateral against those deposits. In the event of failure of a financial institution, securities pledged by that financial institution would be liquidated by the State Treasurer to replace the public deposits not covered by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation (FDIC). If the securities pledged fail to produce adequate funds, every institution participating in the pool would share the liability for the remaining balance.

Note 6 – Defined Benefit Pension Plan

A. Plan Description

The Commission contributes to the Employees' Retirement System of Alabama, an agent multiple-employer public employee retirement system that acts as a common investment and administrative agent for the various state agencies and departments.

Substantially all employees of the Commission are members of the Employees' Retirement System of Alabama. Membership is mandatory for covered or eligible employees of the Commission. Benefits vest after 10 years of creditable service. Vested employees may retire with full benefits at age 60 or after 25 years of service. Retirement benefits are calculated by two methods with the retiree receiving payment under the method, which yields the highest monthly benefit. The methods are (1) Minimum Guaranteed, and (2) Formula, of which the Formula method usually produces the highest monthly benefit. Under this method retirees are allowed 2.0125% of their average final salary (best three of the last ten years) for each year of service. Disability retirement benefits are calculated in the same manner. Pre-retirement death benefits in the amount of the annual salary for the fiscal year preceding death is provided to plan members.

The Employees' Retirement System was established as of October 1, 1945, under the provisions of Act Number 515, Acts of Alabama 1945, for the purpose of providing retirement allowances and other specified benefits for State employees, State police, and on an elective basis to all cities, counties, towns and quasi-public organizations. The responsibility for general administration and operation of the Employees' Retirement System is vested in the Board of Control. Benefit provisions are established by the *Code of Alabama 1975*, Sections 36-27-1 through 36-27-103, as amended, Sections 36-27-120 through 36-27-139, as amended, and Sections 36-27B-1 through 36-27B-6. Authority to amend the plan rests with the Legislature of Alabama. However, the Legislature has granted the Commission authority to accept or reject various Cost-Of-Living-Adjustments (COLAs) granted to retirees.

The Retirement Systems of Alabama issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the Employees' Retirement System of Alabama. That report may be obtained by writing to The Retirement Systems of Alabama, 135 South Union Street, Montgomery, Alabama 36130-2150.

B. Funding Policy

Employees of the Commission, with the exception of full-time law enforcement officers, are required by statute to contribute 5 percent of their salary to the Employees' Retirement System. As of January 1, 2001, full-time law enforcement officers are required by statute to contribute 6 percent of their salary to the Employees' Retirement System. The Commission is required to contribute the remaining amounts necessary to fund the actuarially determined contributions to ensure sufficient assets will be available to pay benefits when due. The contribution requirements of the Commission are established by the Employees' Retirement System based on annual actuarial valuations. The employer's contribution rate for the period ending September 30, 2008 was 7.34 percent based on the actuarial valuation performed as of September 30, 2006. Morgan County Commission elected to come under the provisions of Act Number 2007-257, Acts of Alabama, which provided a one-time lump sum payment to eligible benefit recipients whose effective date of retirement was prior to December 14, 2007. This election caused the employer contribution rate to change from 7.34 percent to 7.60 percent as of January 1, 2008.

C. Annual Pension Cost

For the year ended September 30, 2008, the Commission's annual pension cost of \$892,481.09 was equal to the Commission's required and actual contribution. The required contribution was determined using the "entry age normal" method. The actuarial assumptions as of September 30, 2007, the latest actuarial valuation date, were: (a) 8 percent investment rate of return on present and future assets, and (b) projected salary increases ranging from 7.75 percent at age 20 to 4.61 percent at age 65. Both (a) and (b) include an inflation component of 4.5 percent. The actuarial value of assets was determined using techniques that smooth the effects of short-term volatility in the market value of investments over a five-year period. The unfunded actuarial accrued liability is being amortized as a level percentage of projected payroll on an open basis. The remaining amortization period as of September 30, 2007, was 18 years.

D. Funded Status and Funding Progress

As of September 30, 2007, the most recent actuarial valuation date, the plan was 86.5 percent funded. The actuarial accrued liability for benefits was \$29,317,346 and the actuarial value of assets was \$25,352,638, resulting in an unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL) of \$3,964,707. The covered payroll (annual payroll of active employees covered by the plan) was \$11,567,370 and the ratio of the UAAL to the covered payroll was 34.3 percent.

The Schedule of Funding Progress, presented as RSI following the notes to the statements, presents multiyear trend information about whether the actuarial value of plan assets is increasing or decreasing over time relative to the actuarial accrued liability for benefits.

Note 7 – Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

The Commission offers health insurance to its retired employees. This is offered to all employees who retire in accordance with conditions for retirement set forth in the Employee Retirement Systems of Alabama regulations. The Commission pays a portion of the cost of the retiree's insurance until the retiree reaches age 65. The Commission paid out \$138,239.00 for 25 retirees under this plan.

Note 8 – Contingent Liabilities

The Commission is involved in litigation or threatened litigation in which the other parties are seeking either remedies to certain conditions or monetary compensation. An estimate of the range of potential loss cannot be made at this time.

Note 9 – Construction and Other Significant Commitments

During the audit period, the Commission contracted to build a Restroom Facility for North Park. The construction cost of the project is expected to be \$72,150.00. Total costs as of September 30, 2008 were \$32,571.72, which include construction cost and architect fees.

During the audit period, the Commission paid for architectural services in the amount of \$13,495.72 and \$21,028.00 for new facilities for Morgan County Animal Control and Morgan County Environmental Services, respectively. Construction costs for these facilities are estimated to be \$903,433 for the Animal Control facility and \$1,031,348 for the Environmental Services facility, according to bids received on December 16, 2008.

Note 11 – Lease Obligations

Capital Leases

The Commission is obligated under certain leases accounted for as capital leases. Assets under capital leases totaled \$1,359,764.00 for governmental activities at September 30, 2008. If the Commission completes the lease payments according to the schedules below, which is the stated intent of the Commission, ownership of the leased equipment will pass to the Commission. The lease purchase contracts give the Commission the right to cancel the lease with 30 days written notice and payment of a pro rata share of the current year’s lease payments. Until that time, the leased equipment will be identified separately in the Notes to the Financial Statements. Note 12 – Long-Term Debt

The Commission issued General Obligation Bonds in the year 2000 to provide funds for the construction of Trico Steel, a plant to be built in Morgan County with variable rates of 3.9 to 4.1 percent.

In 2000, Taxable General Obligation Warrants were issued with an interest rate of 2.8 percent for the repair and construction of county-owned public buildings.

In June 2003, General Obligation Warrants were issued with variable interest rates of 2.4 to 4.5 percent to refund the 1995 Bond Issue and for additional capital necessary to build the new court-ordered jail.

In August 2004, General Obligation Warrants were issued with variable interest rates of 4.4 to 5 percent to build the new jail.

The capital lease liability for governmental activities will be liquidated mainly by the Gasoline Tax Fund.

The compensated absences liability attributable to the governmental activities will be liquidated by several of the Commission's governmental funds. The majority of the liability will be liquidated through the Commission's General Fund and Gasoline Tax Fund. The remainder will be liquidated by other governmental funds. The Estimated Liability for Compensated Absences for Fiduciary Funds was adjusted to a zero balance to reflect the reclassification of the Law Library Fund, formerly a Private Purpose Trust Fund, to a Governmental Fund.

Note 13 – Risk Management

The Commission is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The Commission has general liability insurance through a commercial carrier. The Commission pays an annual premium based on the Commission's individual claims experience. Coverage is provided up to \$2,000,000.00 per claim for a maximum total coverage of \$6,000,000.00.

Notes to the Financial Statements
For the Year Ended September 30, 2008

The Commission has workers' compensation insurance through the Association of County Commissions of Alabama (ACCA) Workers' Compensation Self Insurance Fund, a public entity risk pool. Premiums are based on a rate per \$100 of remuneration for each class of employee, which is adjusted by an experience modifier for the individual county less a 15% discount. At year-end, pool participants are eligible to receive refunds of unused premiums and the related investment earnings.

The Commission purchases commercial insurance for its other risks of loss, including property and casualty insurance and employee health insurance. Settled claims resulting from these risks have not exceeded commercial insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

The Commission is self-insured with regard to employee health insurance. The Commission purchases insurance for claims in excess of the aggregate stop loss basis. The aggregate stop loss basis is determined annually based on the Commission's claim experience. An estimate of the claims liability is included in payables and is reported in the General Fund. The entire long-term liability is included in the government-wide financial statements. These liabilities are based on estimates utilizing past experience.

Note 17 – Subsequent Events

At a meeting of the Morgan County Commission on June 9, 2009, the County Commission agreed to settle litigation with Solutia, Incorporated regarding sales, use and gross receipts taxes. The resolution provides for the Commission to pay Solutia \$609,000 with interest at six percent (6%) per annum. These payments shall be made from sales, use and gross receipts license taxes in twelve (12) equal monthly installments, commencing July 20, 2009. In the event such revenue is insufficient to make such payments, the remainder shall be paid from other sources available to Morgan County. These payments shall fully satisfy Solutia's claims for a refund of all sales, use and gross receipts license tax revenue.



Compliance
